Stimulating and Encouraging

Have you ever tried doing something, especially something challenging and difficult, without any encouragement? It's not much fun and it can end up being really discouraging, can't it? That's exactly how God has created us, to work and be together! As God created this world and all living things, He pronounced each part of His



creation as "good" (Genesis 1:4, 10, 12, 18, 21, 25, 31). But Genesis chapter 2 backs up a bit and reviews God's creation and tells us the very first thing that God ever identified as "not good" (Genesis 2:18). That first "not good" thing was the first person being alone. As God corrects this first thing that was "not good," He creates the perfect, proper compliment to man, a woman. One of those interesting Biblical errors that everyone imagines is true until they actually read the text, is that silly term "helpmeet." Go ahead and check your Bible. "Helpmeet" is NOT there. What the King James English does say is "help meet," that is (as the translators knew the Hebrew words actually mean) a helper/assistant that is equal or a compliment to him. "Helpmeet" is technically a "ghost word" that was created and brought into usage by misreading and mistaken understanding. (More technically, "help" is a noun and "meet" is an adjective but people in the late 1600s began using it as a modified noun and changed the actual meaning of God's word.) The point God is making (and that's what counts!), is that people NEED people to help and work together with them to be complete and "good" as God intended. That, of course, is what leads to marriage as God defines it, a man and a woman working together for God. God goes on to show repeatedly that, while the marriage relationship is the first design of working together, there are also many other levels of partnership that are good in their own way. Family is meant to be, much like marriage, a reflection of the relationship between God and people. The Bible is full of parallels to the family as an example of God's people and their God (cf. Isaiah 63:16). Friendship is also a parallel to both family and our relationship with God. Solomon would remind us that there is a friend who sticks closer than a brother (Proverbs 18:24b). So, what has all this to do with stimulating, encouraging and helping one another? Actually, everything! In Christ we are called to be family. Brothers and sisters with Him who died for us and joint heirs with Him of our Heavenly Father (cf. Romans 8:17). And if family is designed by God to support, compliment and work together with each other, then it is to all our benefit to do more than just co-exist. We are NOT called to just get along but to encourage, help and support each other... just like God designed and called us to be! You recall the humorous challenge of Hebrews 3:13: But encourage one another day after day, as long as it is still called "Today," so that none of you will be hardened by the deceitfulness of sin. Since it is ALWAYS "Today," this is ALWAYS our responsibility. The same inspired writer goes on to challenge us to draw near with a sincere heart in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for He who promised is faithful; and let us consider how to stimulate one another to love and good deeds, not forsaking our own assembling together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another; and all the more as you see the day drawing near. (Hebrews 10:22-25) Look closely at those words. We "draw near" or

get closer to God because of His cleansing (forgiveness of sins through the blood of Christ). And we hold on to that salvation by the togetherness of the family in Christ. Our stimulation, helping each other to continue together and our encouragement is just as vital to our salvation as is God's forgiveness. God knows that we cannot do this alone and He never asks us to do that. Jesus always sent His workers out to work together (cf. Mark 6:6-7 and Luke 10:1). And God commands us to not only work together but to be the stimulus, the encouragement for each other. No, you do NOT ever have to do it alone! God is ALWAYS there. And anyone that truly loves and serves God is ALWAYS there with you and for you. Together let us accomplish the work that He has given us to do. Together let us be the light in this world of darkness. Together let us go to live eternally with Him. — Lester P. Bagley
